The young cricket team of Singer Industries, Ratmalana, the double winners of Mercantile Cricket Association (M.C.A.) "F" Division(1985) and "E" Division (1986), was honored by the management of Singer, led by the sportive Chairman, Mr. HemakaAmarasuriya, and Mr. Bertie Fernando, President, Singer Sports Club, when the team was granted a cricket tour of Malaysia and Singapore in 1987. The team left for Kuala Lumpur by air on the 11th April, 1987. The tour was very successful and eventful too. We played matches with Royal Seangor Club and Kelab P.J. in Kuala Lumpur, Ipoh Club in Ipoh, and Royal Malaysian Navy in Lumut. We also flew over to Singapore and played Ceylon Sports Club at the Singapore Padang. Our champion team, led by former Nalandian Cricketer Diyunuge "Keith" Gnanaratne, won all matches on tour, displaying great team-work, and enjoyed the warm hospitality of Malaysians and Singaporeans.

Our last engagement was in Singapore, which was reduced to a 30 over match to enable us to catch the connecting flight to Sri Lanka from Kuala Lumpur on the same evening. Having reached Kuala Lumpur Airport in high spirits after a victorious record of five (05) wins, the players were deeply anxious to make the flight back home. Our manager Mr. Bertie Fernando, who had to attend an official Singer business conference in Singapore, after handing over the responsibilities to yours truly (Assistant Manager), bade good-bye to all, and took a flight back to Singapore. Next came the shock of our lives! When we proceeded to the ticket counter at the airport in Kuala Lumpur, the officer at hand, after perusing our group ticket, informed me that there is no room for all of us, but could carry only eight (08) of us in the flight to Sri Lanka. The reason he gave was that we had not duly re-confirmed our journey. I insisted that our Manager did re-confirm, but he was adamant, and we were asked to wait. Finally, the flight took off and we were physically and mentally stranded at the Airport. Next flight to Sri Lanka, was in two (02) days' time.

I managed to contact the Sri Lankan Embassy, and fortunately the Second Secretary happened to be a friend mine, Mr. Gamini Moonesinghe – Thankfully, he brought an Embassy van, and took us to the Embassy and provided us dinner and bed for the night. The following morning I contacted Mr. Singham, the Finance Director of Singer, Malaysia and he came to our rescue by re-arranging our stay at the hotel. I also contacted Mr. Bertie Fernando, in Singapore and briefed him about our plight. He promised to come back to be with us, soon.

Everyone of us, by then had expended all our monies, except for a few dollars kept to be used at the duty free shops in Katunayake. Some of our players had found the Buddhist temple close by and had gone there to find solace to their worried minds and to worship. There, the High Priest, having heard about their sorry plight had served them with sweets, fruits and soft drinks etc.

Mr. Bertie Fernando, arrived from Singapore, the following afternoon. His presence brought a cheer and smile among all of us, as he announced that he had finalized our flight back home. With this announcement, Mr. Fernando really lifted our spirits again, and doubled our joy, when he took a bottle of "Johnny Walker", from his bag and placed it before us.

So, the next morning – 20th April – we took the train from Kuala Lumpur to Singapore – and finally took the flight to Sri Lanka in the afternoon. Mr. Bertie Fernando bade us goodbye again at the railway station, and left us to take another flight back to Singapore to continue his business mission. Finally, the team arrived back in Sri Lanka on the same evening and reported back for work on the 21st April, having missed two days of work. The tour was a superb one with thrilling experiences, shocks and surprises, fun and excitement which we shall never forget.

OUR JACKIE MEETS ISAAC MERRITT SINGER - JACKIE GUNASEKERA

As you will remember our Trojan personality of the Agro Division of the past, Jackie Gunasekera had met the legendaryinventor of the Singer Sewing Machine Isaac Merritt Singer in his dreams and this is what

he says about the inventor and his invention. - Editor 'The Singer Sewing Machine was the creation of Isaac Merritt Singer who was born in Oswego, N.Y. IN 1811, The eighth son of a German immigrant, Singer worked as a travelling actor, ditchdigger, cabinet maker and peripatetic inventor. At the age of 38, he borrowed \$40 and began tinkering with what would become the first Sewing Machine that could be used by a home-maker. Introduced in 1850, it was an immediate success. Said Singer, "I dont care a damn for the invention. The dimes are what I am after. He eventually pocketed \$1.3 Million, some of which supported 24 children by two wives and at least three eventually pocketed \$1.3 Million, some of which supported 24 children by two wives and at least three mistresses. He died in England at the age of 64 while constructing a half-a-million dollar mansion that he


referred to facetiously as his 'wigwam'. Mahatma Gandhi called the Singer Sewing Machine " One of the few useful things ever invented". Admiral Richard Byrd carried six Singer Machines with him to the Antarctic. During the late 19th Century, Russia's Czar Alexander 111, ordered workers to use the machines to make 250 tents for the Imperial Army. Founded in 1851, Singer was one of first US Multinational Corporations and, of course its red "S" trademark became a

familiar sight in houscholds all across America.

THE CASE OF THE WOOD WORK FINISHING

Work in the Wood Work Finishing Section in the Singer factory centredaround producing machine cabinets for the Kotahena warehouse. Cabinets came in piece form from the Wood Work White and underwent the process of staining, sealing, and lacquer-spraying before being assembled and packed in wooden crates for delivery. Job functions here comparatively were hardly laborious, and the towering reality was that the workmen needed roughness because they had wallowed too long in vicious softness.

With his forte in lacquer spraying, Wilbert, with all-round work knowledge was a Charge Hand. On collecting his weekly overtime earnings on Thursdays, he never failed to pay his courtesies at Magilin'silicit liquor den at Gonakovila. During the unofficial morning break, he would slink to the washroom corridor area and share his Mavy Cut cigarette with others who converged there for a smoke. In contrast, Charge Hand Wijetunge maintained his respect, handled all documentary work and like someone feeling the pangs of sympathy for the rest of God's creation, assisted subordinates accomplish their daily 'count'. White products were given the wood colour by stain sprayman Suranimala who despite a big bulk and the name of one of King Dutugemunu's warrior chieftains overcame with terrror, threw away the spray gun in hand screaming, "ginnak, ginnak" and fled when the spray booth caught fire at the time a wire mesh was being welded from the outside. The fire was spotted yards away bySathiyamoorthy nicknamed Siam Pol due to his coconut shaped head who raced to the fire cart, jerked out the hose and pulled out the safety pin simultaneously squeezing the lever. Before you could say 'Jack Robinson' a stream of 5000 kgs chemical powder gushed out and rained down, covering Siam Pol from head to foot converting him into a virtual ghost in white. The cart eventually wheeled to the scene of the fire, was totally empty.

The lacquer spraying phase was completed by a classy sprayman Patrick Nelson with Hugh Samarasinghe as helper, and the highly lacquered items were conspicuous and outstanding. However one quality that quick tempered Patrick clearly failed to impart was toleration for human frailty.

The sanding operation was performed by 4ft 5ins tall Heen Banda and Linton Fernando who completed the job in half the time. Linton, whose skin was abnormally thick by regular consumption of tortoise flesh, would spread the racing sheet on the floor and pick his horse on which the first fly settled. Need it be mentioned that he only ended a loser the following morning?

The flimsy jobs of R.N. Fernando were mirthfully, cutting gum tape, cutting paper, checking runners, wrapping drawers and wrapping bent covers. When Factory Director Sriyan De Silva wanted to purchase a sewing machine, Sirisoma produced a cabinet, the veneer grains which were of a beautifully formed rosette pattern like those on a leopard, the likes of which had never been seen anywhere, insisting that the Singer Factory Director should be the proud owner of a beautiful and unique cabinet. Thirty years later, at the time of writing this story, he revealed that he had been reserving the cabinet for himself.
