

During the 13 years I worked at Unilever, my salary had crept up to Rs8,500/- It was in 1987 that I was offered a position by Simger Sri Lanka, and I joined the legendary Gamma Abeyasurya

I left school in 1971, and joined the Arpico Factory as a Production Trainee, along with five of my classmates. It was our first job, and very exciting with the shift work, which left two weeks of free daytime for us to go swimming, to see movies, visit friends and party. The salary of Rs125/- plus overtime, was a princely sum for a young school leaver, and we had ourselves a jolly good time. However the glamour faded soon, and by 1974

The first thing I experienced at Singer was, a "culture shock". The American style and British style of doing business, was totally different, but I was soon able to integrate into the new culture.Gamani Abeysuriya was a "master at setting up distribution networks" and the Singer network is what it is today, due to the pioneering work done by him.

The Chairman Hemaka Amarasuriya, with a background in both Finance and Marketing, was a man with a Vision -" to make Singer the Largest and Best Appliance & Electronics Retailer in South Asia ". For Singer - known only for its sewing machine, this was a far fetched dream, but in the eyes of chairman, something achievable."

We brought in Jaliya Jayasuriya and Rienzie Martinesz from Unilever and Shehara Parakrama from Reckitt & Coleman, to strengthen our Merchandising and Marketing efforts. Jaliya was directly responsible for setting up the Mega Channel outlets in Kandy and Rajagiriya, and also our foray into Sports marketing and Sponsorship of Sri Lanka Cricket. Winning the Cricket World Cup in 1996, gave a major boost to the Singer brand name worldwide. Jaliya unfortunately was a victim of the Tsunami tragedy of 2004. Investing heavily in Training at all levels of Management, through Local as well as International Trainers, Hemaka Amarasuriya sold his "Vision of Singer #1", to his staff , and mapped out the Strategy for future success, within a framework of Multi Brands and Multi Channels.Very soon "Chairmans Vision became Our Mission."

I had a dream run at Singer for 22 long years, moving from Sales Manager to Marketing Services Manager , Marketing Manager , Deputy Marketing Director and finally Marketing Director In 2001. Along the way I had the privilege to work and learn my trade alongside a host of top professionals like Hemaka Amarasuriya, Gamani Abeysuriya, Neville Peries, Anton Abeysekera, P. Shivaji and ever green Gamini Wasalathanthri.

We were building Concepts & Processes which would be sustainable. In hindsight I see that it was done with the Customer at our focal point. I was lucky to be a participant in the Key Management Team that was instrumental in setting up the Wholesale Channel to supplement the existing Retail network, build the concept of Brand Management and Multi Brands, expansion of Retail network, launching the Mega and Sisil channels to consolidate our Multi channel strategy, venturing into Sports sponsorship and Sports marketing and transforming Singer into a Consumer Centric company.

Chairmans direct involvement in setting up the Service network, with people like Anil Samarasekera and later Shyam Ramanathan consolidated our position as No1 Electronics & Appliance Retailer in Sri Lanka. In fact it was a key differentiator for Singer, at the time set up, taking Service to the Consumers doorstep.

moving into the Marketing Directors office in 2001, I initiated a strategic move to create a position of a Sales Director. Murali Prakash was the first incumbent, with his years of experience in Field sales and Credit management, making him an obvious choice.

It was also fortunate to have people of the caliber of Asoka Peiris, Mahesh Wijewardena, Priyath Salgado, Chitral Perera, Nasser Majeed , Kumar Samarasinghe, Senani Perera, Jude Joseph, Mihindu Rajaratna, Mohamed Fairoz , Dhammadika Wijesundara , Sanjaya Karunaratne and Ravi Balraj as work colleagues. We arguably had the cream of marketing talent working for Singer during this era, and thus made my task easier.

Under my watch Singer was voted as the "Brand of the Year", an accolade we still win up to now, and was a vindication of the Consumer centric company that Singer had become.

Projects like the "Singer Rugby League" helped us get into the mindset of the Youth , who were going to be our future Customers. I took my retirement in 2009, happy with the thought that I had built a "second line of management" more capable and qualified than me, to take Singer into the future.
